Recognized as an expert on transportation safety issues and advisory strategies, Mr. Worrell regularly addresses local, state, and international governments; private industry; various organizations; youth safety leaders; and educators instructing on NTSB safety investigations and the adoption of safety regulations throughout the private and government sectors.

In 2019, Mr. Worrell spoke before the Nigerian, Kenyan and South African government on Effective Safety Advocacy, and Creating Positive Change in Transportation Safety in Kenya as part of the Safer Skies Program, and coordinated safety efforts throughout the Caribbean region, including in Jamaica, Guyana, Trinidad, and Barbados. Determined to leverage his bilingual skills, Anthony spent the next 13 years in Asia, championing aviation safety best practices as the editor-in-chief for a bilingual general aviation magazine. While leading Asia's business aviation advocacy group years later, Anthony spearheaded regional aviation safety summits, conferences, roundtables, and advocacy events. He pioneered Asia's first business aviation aircrew mental health initiative and Illegal Charter Reporting System in 2021.

A passionate builder of bridges across cultures, Anthony is committed to collaboration and knowledge sharing beyond borders. Anthony launched the first-ever aviation safety summits connecting the NTSB with civil aviation authorities across Asia from 2020 to 2022.
